



## 2013 High-level Dialogue on International Migration and Development process (UNGA resolution 65/170)

- Resolution on theme and modalities: UNGA 67<sup>th</sup> session (Oct 2012)
- Regional commissions and other relevant entities (IOM, etc.): regional preparations
- High-level Dialogue: Sep (?) 2013
- Resolution on HLD outcomes and future (?)

#### Common set of indicators

- Why?
  - Allows for comparing Migration Profiles
- What?
  - Standard format
  - Global coverage
- How?
  - Through website

### Which indicators? (Examples)

#### Population:

- Population size
- Population changes

#### International migration:

- Migrant stocks (total, age and sex, origin)
- Migration flows (origin and destination)

#### Development:

- GDP, Human development index
- Remittance flows

### Data sources: strengths and weaknesses

|                     | Population census | Administrative sources | Surveys |

### The five steps to improve migration data in the long term, with existing institutions and at low cost are ...

- Ask basic census questions country of birth, citizenship, previous residence by age and sex and tabulate and disseminate the answers
- Compile and release existing administrative data
- Centralize labour force surveys
- Provide access to microdata
- Include migration modules on more existing household surveys

Build capacity to collect and disseminate data

### How can migration information facilitate emergency response?

- Invest in registration (before departure in home country, after arrival at destination)
- Exchange information with host country
- Share good practices and lessons learnt
- Recommend as a theme for 2013 HLD
