

Ninth Global Forum for Migration and Development Thematic Workshop on Connectivity – Migration – Business Modalities for Break-out Sessions

Bangkok, 14.45 - 16.30, 29 March 2016

There will be two simultaneous break-out sessions, one focusing on the role of regional and bilateral agreements for promoting connectivity and mobility; the other focusing on how migration can increase further economic engagements, particularly trade and investments.

Each break-out session will have a **moderator** and **rapporteur** from the Chair's task team (as below) to facilitate the discussions around the respective guiding questions.

Participants would be asked to reflect on the plenary discussions (*before lunch*) and make reference **to their national and regional experiences** on the topics of their respective break-out session. In the discussions, they may particularly bring up:

unique policy and **programme experiences/interventions** (which may have potential to be adapted elsewhere; possible pitfalls/unintended consequences and roles of different actors); and also,

institutional implications (i.e. possible shortcomings of existing institutions/process and how these could be addressed - either through improvement of existing mechanisms or, through establishment of new mechanisms).

The break-out sessions will be opened by some general reflections by the moderators. Thereafter, participants will be encouraged to engage in **interactive dialogue**.
